Reading of Law: John 13:34

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another.

Prayer of Confession:

Our Father in Heaven, blessed be your most glorious name. We thank you for your love for us and how you have displayed this love in the most unmistakable of ways in sending your Son, our Savior, to die in our place for our sins. This is the love of God, and there is no greater love than this. As your people this is the example you have set for us, telling us to love one another just as you have loved us, yet we confess we have failed to do this. We love self more than we love our brothers and sisters in Christ. We are more concerned about self than about one another. We do not adequately express the love of God to other believers, but the love we show is often tepid and temperamental, depending more on feelings and emotions than on the power of the Holy Spirit. Father, please forgive us and please work your love in us so that we would love one another as your Son has loved us. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Assurance of Forgiveness: Romans 5:8-9

But God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. ⁹ Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God.

WLC: 196 (The final question of the WLC! Next week we will begin the Heidelberg Catechsim)

Q. 196. What does the conclusion of the Lord's Prayer teach us?

A. The conclusion of the Lord's Prayer, (which is, For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and

the glory, forever. Amen.) teaches us to enforce our petitions with arguments, which are to be taken, not from any worthiness in ourselves, or in any other creature, but from God: and with our prayers to join praises, ascribing to God alone eternal sovereignty, omnipotency, and glorious excellency; in regard whereof, as he is able and willing to help us, so we by faith are emboldened to plead with him that he would, and quietly to rely upon him, that he will fulfill our requests. And, to testify this our desire and assurance, we say, Amen.

NT Reading: Revelation 15:1-8

Then I saw another sign in heaven, great and amazing, seven angels with seven plagues, which are the last, for with them the wrath of God is finished. ² And I saw what appeared to be a sea of glass mingled with fire-- and also those who had conquered the beast and its image and the number of its name, standing beside the sea of glass with harps of God in their hands. ³ And they sing the song of Moses, the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb, saying, "Great and amazing are your deeds, O Lord God the Almighty! Just and true are your ways, O King of the nations! ⁴ Who will not fear, O Lord, and glorify your name? For you alone are holy. All nations will come and worship you, for your righteous acts have been revealed." ⁵ After this I looked, and the sanctuary of the tent of witness in heaven was opened, ⁶ and out of the sanctuary came the seven angels with the seven plagues, clothed in pure, bright linen, with golden sashes around their chests. ⁷ And one of the four living creatures gave to the seven angels seven golden bowls full of the wrath of God who lives forever and ever, ⁸ and the sanctuary was filled with smoke from the glory of God and from his power, and no one could enter the sanctuary until the seven plagues of the seven angels were finished.
